

# **BORDERWARE**

*Medieval and post-medieval pottery was made in three clay fabrics from a number of pottery sites in Cove and Farnborough.*

*The kitchen and table-ware is known as 'Border-ware', manufactured on the Surrey – Hampshire border.*

*The earliest fabric is Coarse Border-ware (CBW), based on white firing clay with gritty texture and produced in the period 1370 – 1500. This type of clay was found in outcrops of Reading Beds which runs through Farnham and Tongham.*



*The next fabric is White Border-ware (BORD), again based on white firing clay but manufactured with a variety of glazes from the 16<sup>th</sup> century to the early 18<sup>th</sup> century.*



*The third fabric is Red Border-ware (RBOR), based on a red firing clay and made with a similar range of glazes as BORD but with production extending to the late 19<sup>th</sup> century.*
